**VI. QUALIFICATION OF COMPETITORS & HORSES**

Each NF must certify the qualification of each horse and rider and list the competitions which enabled horse and rider to qualify, according to the qualification procedure established for each star level as laid out in Art. 506. Relevant level and criteria must be included in the schedule.

**2.1. Principles**

In order to compete at an international event, a rider and horse must have obtained a Qualifying Result (QR) at a number of events at a lower level. The requirements are laid out below. With the approval of the FEI and their own NF, OCs may impose additional qualifications for horses and/or riders, which must be published in the schedule.

**2.2. Qualifying Result (QR)**

A qualifying result (QR) is achieved by completing a competition within minimum parameters of all round performance. As follows:

- ❖ not more than 75 penalty points in the Dressage Test; and

- ❖ not more than 20 penalties at obstacles on the Cross Country Test, and not more than 90 seconds exceeding the optimum time in the Cross. For 4\* events, the maximum time by which the optimum time may be exceeded is 120 seconds as from 2005; and
- ❖ not more than 16 penalties at obstacles in the Jumping Test.

### **2.3. Certification of Qualification for Events**

2.3.1. All NF's, including the host nation, are responsible to certify that riders and horses entered by them in international events are correctly qualified in accordance with all the requirements of the Rules.

2.3.2. All qualifying events must be identified, and any national events must be certified as of at least the equivalent standard of difficulty as the relevant international star level of competition.

2.3.3. The Technical Delegate or his nominee shall check that all horses and riders starting at all International events are properly certified as qualified by their NF or duly exempted in accordance with this article.

### **2.4. Qualifying Period and Deadline**

2.4.1. QRs for CIOs, CCIs and CICs must be obtained in the calendar year in question or the 2 preceding calendar years.

2.4.2. The deadline for obtaining the final CIC/CNC QR is 2 weeks before the first Dressage day of the event unless an earlier date is specified in the Schedule. The deadline for obtaining the CCI QR is 4 weeks before the first dressage day of the event unless an earlier date is specified in the Schedule.

2.4.3. Qualifications may be achieved as a combination or separately by rider and horse.

## **VII. FACILITIES OFFERED (Art. 132, 133)**

### **B) GROOMS**

Accommodation has to be booked by the grooms/competitors themselves. Accommodation and meals will be at the competitors' own cost. Caravans and other live-in vehicles can only be parked if requested and paid for (Euro 50.-) with the entry.  
Sufficient sanitary and showering facilities for male and female grooms, with hot and cold water, will be provided by the OC.

### **C) HORSES / PONIES**

Stabling arrangements, from 30.04.08 to 04.05.08 in stable tents. Private tents or stabling on lorries is not permitted. Stabling is included in

the entry fee. For shavings an additional fee of 25,00 € will be charged. Hay and straw will be handed out free of charge. For electricity a fee of 50,00 € will be levied.

**For withdrawals after the date of definite entries or no-shows the competitor or the respective NF will be held liable to reimburse the OC for the actual financial loss incurred by the OC (i.e. stabling and hotel expenses) as a result of the late withdrawal or no-show.**

Entries are not accepted unless they contain full details according to FEI requirements, especially including the records of results.

## **IX. CUSTOMS FORMALITIES/HEALTH REQUIREMENTS**

### **1. Customs Formalities**

For questions pertaining to the veterinary and animal diseases legislation for horses from abroad and regarding the horses' transportation, the OC is ready to assist.

Customs and veterinary fees for horses from abroad will not be taken over.

### **2. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR THE ENTRY OF HORSES**

Every competitor is supplied to deliver all necessary certificates of health for the transport to the event or identification of the horses before they come into the stables:

- a) in case of arrival from a EU-member-country, a certificate for registered horses acc. to sample of Annex B to Reglements 90/426 of the actual valid form (sample is enclosed to schedule) will be necessary.
- b) in case of arrival from a country not concerning to the EU, a certificate of health for registered horses acc. to sample of annex II of the decision of the commission 92/260 of the actual valid form will be necessary.

A certificate must be done in at least one official language of the country of destination and in one official language of the member country. The competitor must carry with him the original certificate, not a copy.

The organiser sees to it that on the competition site, an official state veterinarian is present to issue the health certificates which are necessary for the transport of the horses to their destination abroad.

In case the OC has entrusted to a forwarding agency, the latter is ready to assist regarding the required documents.

Furthermore, questions relating to health requirements for horses can be directed to the veterinary authorities in the country of origin or in Germany.

**If health certificates are requested, the competitors have to advice the show office by Thursday, 1<sup>st</sup> May, 2008 by 4.00 p.m. at the latest. The fee for the health papers has to be paid by the competitor.**

VETERINARY EXAMINATIONS, HORSE INSPECTIONS & PASSPORT CONTROLS

These will be carried out in accordance with the "Veterinary Regulations", Art. 1011 & "Rules for Eventing" Art. 518.1 for CCIs and 518.2 for CICs.

"General Regulations", 22<sup>nd</sup> edition, effective June 2007:

Art. 511.2.2

Every horse entered for any competition at CCNs, CICs 2/1\* or CCIs 2/1\* in a foreign country (GRs Art. 141.2), and all horses entered for CICs 3\*, CCIs 4/3\*, CCIOs, Championships, Regional and Olympic Games, whether at home or in foreign countries, must have an official valid FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI and accompanied by an FEI Recognition Card and, when applicable, an FEI registration number, as a means of identification and to establish ownership.

Art. 511.2.3

Horses taking part in CCNs, CICs 2/1\* or CCIs 2/1\* in the country in which they are resident are not required to have such a passport as is mentioned Paragraph 2.2. All such horses must be properly registered and identifiable and unless there is no national requirement for equine influenza vaccination in the host country and in the country of origin, all horses must have a valid vaccination certificate.

EQUINE INFLUENZA VACCINATION, VET. REGS. ANNEX VII  
(except events taking place in NZL & AUS)

All horses and ponies for which an FEI Passport, or a National Passport approved by the FEI has been issued, must have the vaccination section endorsed by a veterinarian, stating that it has received two injections for primary vaccination against equine influenza, given between 1 and 3 months apart. In addition, a booster injection must be recorded as having been given within each succeeding 6 months, subsequent to the second injection of the primary vaccination. None of these injections must have been given within the preceding 7 days including the day of the competition or of entry into the competition stables.

The above are the minimum requirements for influenza vaccination. Both primary and first and subsequent booster injections should be given according to the manufacturer's instructions which will fall within the stipulation of the FEI ruling.

SAMPLING FOR PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES (Vet. Regs. Chapter V & VI and Annex IV)

Regular sampling is carried out in CCIs 4/3\*, CCIOs, World Cup™ Qualifiers and Finals, Championships and Games, whereas at other CCIs sampling is recommended. When testing takes place, the number of horses tested is at the discretion of the Testing Veterinarian/Veterinary Delegate; however, a minimum of three is recommended (Vet. Regs. Art. 1016).

Special guidelines are applicable for events covered by the FEI Medication Control Programme (Groups I & II only).

MEDICATION CONTROL PROGRAMME (GROUP I & II ONLY)

The Organising Committees of FEI events within Groups I & II are advised to charge competitors the equivalent of CHF 12.50 per horse per event as a contribution towards the costs of the MCP programme.

## **XI. MISCELLANEOUS**

### **1. PROTESTS**

All protests to be valid must be made in writing and accompanied by a deposit of CHF 150.- or equivalent.

### **2. PRIZE-GIVING CEREMONY**

The placed riders are asked to take part in the prize giving ceremony.

### **3. DISTRIBUTION OF PRIZES AND INDEMNITIES**

All prize money and all prizes in kind rewarded instead of prize money as well as reimbursements (e. g. transport charges, travelling expenses) will be distributed acc. to FEI-RG Art. 130.2 following the last competition at the latest. The scheduled prizes are gross amounts. The total amount of prize money shown for each competition in the schedule must be distributed. If fewer competitors take part in a competition than the number of prizes indicated in the schedule, the President of the Ground Jury is responsible for recalculating the prize money to be distributed.

Per competition 25 % of the competitors receive prize-money or prizes in kind rewarded instead of prize-money, however at least 5 competitors will receive a prize.

If riders have to be placed equally, the money value of the prizes in kind (e. g. a car) is divided accordingly. Settlement will be done per competitor. Depending on the agreement with the horse owner, each competitor binds himself, to pass on to the horse owners the prize money or prizes in kind rewarded instead of prize money. The organizer is allowed to deduct possibly outstanding debts of the competitor. Acc. to § 50a Abs. 4 this also applies to foreign horse owners. After having deducted the turnover tax from the prize money or prizes in kind rewarded instead of prize money the following income tax will be due: no taxes up to 250 EUR, 10 % up to 500 EUR, 15 % up to 1,000 EUR, 20 % exceeding 1,000 EUR; plus 5,5 % solidarity fee of the income tax. The tax deduction has to be confirmed on demand. Those foreign competitors being exempted from tax deduction are kindly asked to submit an exemption certificate either with the entry or on the first show day at the latest. Every competitor himself is responsible for the correctness of the details he submits.

### **4. INSURANCES**

All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their

horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up to date.

**5. LIABILITY**

The organizer declines any liability for property or pecuniary damage which may happen to visitors, competitors, grooms and horse owners through slight negligence of the organizer, his delegates or his assistants. He also declines any liability for theft, damages, fire or other incidents.

**6. MEDICAL Card**

OCs must draw the attention of all competitors that they must carry a medical card easily accessible for the Cross-Country Test. Medical Cards must be collected by the OC upon arrival to the competition and checked by the official doctor and the TD.

**7. EVENT'S ORGANISATION**

In exceptional circumstances, together with the approval of the Delegate of NF GER and Ground Jury the OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matter or matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. Any such changes must be notified to all competitors and officials as soon as possible and must be reported to the FEI Eventing Department by the Foreign Judge.

## **THE FEI CODE OF CONDUCT**

### **FOR THE WELFARE OF THE HORSE**

The Fédération Equestre Internationale (FEI) expects all those involved in international equestrian sport to adhere to the FEI's Code of Conduct and to acknowledge and accept that at all times the welfare of the horse must be paramount and must never be subordinated to competitive or commercial influences.

1. At all stages during the preparation and training of competition horses, welfare must take precedence over all other demands. This includes good horse management, training methods, farriery and tack, and transportation.
2. Horses and competitors must be fit, competent and in good health before they are allowed to compete. This encompasses medication use, surgical procedures that threaten welfare or safety, pregnancy in mares and the misuse of aids.
3. Events must not prejudice horse welfare. This involves paying careful attention to the competition areas, ground surfaces, weather conditions, stabling, site safety and fitness of the horse for onward travel after the event.
4. Every effort must be made to ensure that horses receive proper attention after they have competed and that they are treated humanely when their competition careers are over. This covers proper veterinary care, competition injuries, euthanasia and retirement.
5. The FEI urges all involved with the sport to attain the highest levels of education in their areas of expertise.
